Report to Council of Governors

May 19 2012

As District Governor for N1, I had a number of goals I wanted to complete during my year. One was to visit all 79 clubs in my district. I was well on my way to achieving this when illness struck my family. As you all know, family comes first, career second and then Lions. I had to suspend my visits until my wife fully recovers and I can be assured she is well enough to leave alone if I make an overnight visit to a club. Since it is now May 19, it is unlikely that I will be able to complete my remaining visitations. I have heard it said that if you want to make God laugh, tell Him your plans. I assume He had a good chuckle.

President Tam's trees. I do not believe that any trees have been planted by Lions clubs in my district to honour his request.

We have added 102 new members. Unfortunately, 31 lions have passed away this year and 107 lions have dropped from membership, for a net deficit of 36 mem-

bers.

At our fall conference in Saint John, NB, PIP Al Brandel asked the lions gathered there, "When did you become a Lion?" In March of this year, Perth Andover, NB suffered the worst flood in its history. Near-by clubs in that zone, namely Bath, Tobique, Fort Kent, Fort Fairfield, and Hartland quickly responded to help the flood victims. After consulting with Zone Chair Paul Greer and with the encouragement of 1st VDG Steward, I made an application for an emergency grant from LCIF. Within 3 days I had a cheque in hand for \$10,000. This has been used to provide help to the flood victims in that area. A complete report will soon filed soon with LCIF and copies will be printed in our newsletter once that task is completed. This is not when I became a Lion but certainly my membership was renewed on this occasion.

As I visited clubs this year, I saw where some clubs were doing some project particularly well achieving very successful results. We need to encourage other

We need to encourage other clubs to copy there efforts and duplicate their success. We must advertise and promote those efforts to other clubs so that they can be easily repeated.

Our efforts in Leadership Training have been very successful this year. At each cabinet meeting and at our convention there was always an interesting and timely presentation by our GLT Coordinator, Lion Doug Small. GMT has not been as successful but it appears that it will be back on track for next year. There have been a number of clubs interested in participating in a CEP workshop. Plans are being made to complete some of these before year end.

This has been a year I will not soon forget. I have made many new friends I never knew I had and I have been able to strengthen other friendships. Club visitations have become a priority of mine and I look forward to doing those on a less formal basis in the future.

Thank-you to the lions of N1, MDN and Lions International for allowing me to serve as District Governor.

RIVERVIEW LIONS RESPOND TO "PLEA FOR HELP"

In early October of 2011, three-year old Kendric Campbell from Riverview was diagnosed with a brain tumour which was quickly confirmed as a rare form of brain cancer. Within days, the tumour was removed at the IWK in Halifax and chemotherapy followed – not without its own complications. During the Christmas period, Kendric fought his way through a bout of pneumonia and in January, doctors discovered three inoperable tumours on his spine. Desperately, his parents searched for a miracle and were successful in locating a doctor in Los Angeles and another in Toronto who may be able to help. To ease the financial strain on our community prior to Christmas we decided to wait until the new year to do fundraising of our own. King Lion Brennan Beaumont selected an organizing committee and the work began. In total - 32 Lions, 7 Associates and 3 'soon-to-be' Lions contributed a total of 302 hours to this very successful project. Thank you to each and every one of you --- this Teamwork is what makes a Lions Club a GREAT CLUB!!

A Pancake Breakfast, Raffle and Silent Auction was held on February 18th at the Riverview Lions Community Centre. More than 1000 people came through our doors that day and due to their generosity and that of local groups and businesses, we were able to raise a whopping \$12,769.72 – the largest pancake breakfast ever held by the Riverview Lions!

Just days after his 4th birthday, the donation was given to Kendric's Trust Fund to help with the tremendous financial burden the family is experiencing. Kendric has just returned from another round of chemotherapy in Halifax and the Campbell family awaits news as to where and when they may have to travel to get the help Kendric so desperately needs. Our prayers are with them.


