
It is a licensed establishment. Bring your Valentine for a day of fun.

Special Report to District N-1 Cabinet Meeting (November 8, 2009) subject: Lions Recycle For Sight.

Our Canadian Eyeglass Recycling Centre, located in Calgary - Alberta, is but one of 17 such centres around the world. Eye wear is collected from Coast to Coast for our program.

Glasses are normally shipped by semi- or annual shipments through our District N-1 Chairperson, Lion Gary Rideout of the Barker's Point-Northside Lions Club. (Page 17, Dist.Gov. Claude's Directory). United Van Lines, Mayflower Moving, Day and Ross Transport, or any of their agents, are but 3 moving companies in Canada who often provide this essential service at no cost to many Lions clubs and districts across our country.

Glasses are received and processed at the Calgary Correctional Centre, where the volunteer offenders sort, sanitize, inspect and repair if required. Glasses are read on one of eight Lensometers. The prescription and glasses are placed into a zip-loc bag, then placed into boxes of 350 according to type, (i.e. Reading, Single Vision, Bifocal, Progressive and Children).

Empty eyeglass frames are always used by the Calgary Centre. "Loose lenses" are of no use for distribution., however, UNCUT lenses are adapted and fitted by local contract for empty frames. For health and border security reasons, eyeglasses cases should NOT be shipped to Calgary as they are only dumped into their local landfill. In our Charlottetown area, our club's pick-up depots are, for the most part, no longer putting cases into the collection boxes. Those cases that do reach my home are simply deposited into our large black bin container and picked up monthly by Waste Watch.

Some interesting statistics: From July 1st, 2003 to Dec, 31st, 2008. New Brunswick & PEI collected 110,773 pair of eyeglasses - an average of 20,140 pair per year. Our neighboring district of Nova Scotia collected 149,212, an average of 27,129 in the same time frame. This past year our District N1 had a terrific increase--- spiking up to 26,864 pairs. This was mainly due to the distribution of FREE collection boxes at last February's cabinet and more clubs getting involved in this project.

Speaking of FREE <u>Personalized</u> "THANK YOU" certificates are still available for all clubs to present to any businesses in their area who support them by displaying the Lion's recycle boxes. The Club Secretary, or Project Chairperson, need only supply the individual business name and address to the National Chairman, and he will mail the engraved certificate to your club. There is even a space left on it for signature by a club officer to show your gratitude.

Another item now available, also without charge, is a very decorative 3 inch "Lions Recycle for Sight" banner patch which can be sewn unto your club banner. An excellent way to advertise your club's participation to any visitors. The National Chairman's name / address is as follows

Lions International District N-1 ANNUAL HUMANITARIAN AWARD

Long term plaque donated by Charlottetown Lions Club with winning club to retain same for <u>one</u> year., "Keeper" plaque to be donated by District on an annual basis, from the budget of the serving District Governor, and be retained by the winning club permanently. **Judging period - July 1**st . **- June 30**th . (the Lionistic year)

Guidelines for this award shall be as follows:

- * This award is intended to be presented to a CLUB within the boundaries of Lions Club International District N-1.
- * ALL Clubs within District N-1 shall be eligible and have an equal opportunity to win this award, irrespective of their membership numbers, financial wealth, or other property resources.
- * "Administrative Duties" of individual club officers are <u>NOT</u> to be taken into consideration by the selection committee.(i.e. criteria as established by the District for Best Club, Best Club President, Best Club Secretary Awards shall <u>not</u> be applicable when appraising the eventual winner of this award).
- * Neither shall Financial support for Lions Clubs International Foundation, the Lions Foundation of Canada, a club's granting of awards such as a Melvin Jones Fellowship, Judge Brian Stevenson Fellowship, etc., be a determinant in choosing the winner of this award.

The Selection Committee SHALL base their decision on the following assessments;

- * An individual club project, or a collective number of projects promoting local community service. Examples of qualifiable activities would be any that support local Sight Conservation & Work with the Blind, Hearing Conservation & Work with the Hearing Impaired or Speech Action., Diabetes Awareness., Drug Awareness, etc.
- * The impact of such project(s) to benefit the community, or individual(s) in need.
- * The success of the project(s) and
- * The extent and participation of all club members, who will be working together to achieve a single goal.,
- * A club's overall commitment to the Lions Code of Ethics and Lions Club Objects.

Selection Committee:

<u>IF</u> the office of Regional Chairperson is adopted by the serving District Governor..... Each Zone Chairperson, from the clubs within his / her Zone, shall send <u>one</u> written nomination detailing the project(s) and his / her reasons for naming of club, to the Regional Chairperson, who, shall further submit <u>from the nominations he / she has received</u>, one written nomination to be forwarded to the District Governor as the candidate from his / her Region.

<u>IF</u> the office of Regional Chairperson is NOT adopted by the serving District Governor, then each Zone Chairperson shall send their nomination to the District Governor directly. At his / her discretion, the District Governor in making a final decision, <u>may</u> consult further with those Vice-Governor(s) serving in office during his / her year of office.

Nominations should be in the hands of the District Governor no later than July 15th. to allow time for the purchase of the keeper plaque. This award shall be presented by the D. G. at the first Cabinet Meeting following the close of his / her term of office.

As members of the Charlottetown Lions Club, we are hopeful that this award will become a prestigious honor, eagerly sought after by all clubs. May it become a symbol that each club has extended it's best efforts **TO SERVE**, thereby resulting in many stronger communities and a dynamic District N-1.
