





Multiple District N Fall Conference

The MDN Fall Conference took place in Corner Brook, Newfoundland on the weekend of October 24-26, 2008. District N-1 was well represented with 40+ LIONS in attendance.

There were four workshops for LIONS which were very informative. The first was on the Maxx Simms Camp in Newfoundland for people with disabilities.

The second was on Portage Atlantic and the speaker was LION Susan Sangster of the Barkers Point Lions Club. She did a great job speaking on the need for the program, the success of the individuals and the building of the new facilities.



The third workshop was on the Lions Environmental Photo Contest. This contest is open to all Lions with several categories. The information is on the Lions web site if you choose to participate. A Lion from Newfoundland entered last year and had his picture selected to be used on the Lions Environmental Calendar. The photos are judged at the Club level, the District level and the Multiple District Level and one is selected to be entered into the International competition. Check it out and you just might have an opportunity to get your picture published.

The fourth workshop was on Liability of Lions as Directors, as well as liability for LIONS and Lions' projects. Lion Norah Davidson-Davidson-Wright of Barkers



Point Lions Club presented the workshop and spoke about

incorporation of Lions Clubs, Directors' liability insurance, duties and obligations of Directors, and the Lions International Limited Liability Policy.

During the business session, the budget for this year was passed and there was discussion of the process to get the budgets passed at the Multiple District Convention in May so that we would be operating with a budget and not outside of the Constitution. We have also discussed the need for an increase of revenue and the reduction of some expenditures to run the Multiple due to the restructuring which occurred two years ago. When Maine became its own district, Multiple District N lost approximately 2700 members or approximately \$11,000 in operating capital. To continue to provide the services and training, we need the help from all Lions to make this transition and keep our Multiple District functioning.

At the business session, District Governor Rod was nominated by District Governor Bill from N-1 for the position for Council Chair for the 2009-2010 Lionistic year and the motion was seconded by District Governor Kevin from N-4. District Governor Bill was nominated for the Council Secretary-Treasurer position by District Governor Rod and seconded by District Governor Kevin for 2009-2010.

Our guest speaker was International Director Art Marson from LaCrosse, Wisconsin.



He was very down to earth and spent the weekend talking to Lions, holding a "Bear Pit Session" taking Lions questions and bringing greetings on behalf of Lions International. He and his wife Jo Ann were also

"Screeched In" along with many other Lions. So to say the least they had a great time with all the Maritime hospitality.

District N-3 should be commended for the job they did in putting on the MDN Fall Conference. Congratulations on a great time and for providing weather that was just FANTASTIC.

LIONS LEADERSHIP INSTITUTE MULTIPLE DISTRICT N FACT SHEET

WHAT: The Lions Leadership Institute will be offered to all Lions of Multiple District N. The Institute will be a two-day session starting on Friday afternoon and ending on Sunday afternoon.

WHO: The Lions Leadership Institute is designed for Lions with an interest in becoming leaders. The participants will be nominated, on the attached nomination form, by their club. The selection committee first guarantees that each club making a nomination is represented before any club gets a second representative. If more clubs make nominations than can be accommodated selection will be by a competitive screening process done by the selection committee. We expect that some clubs might not make a nomination. Therefore, you may submit two nominees with your first choice being you top priority.

WHERE: The Lions Leadership Institute will be held at the Lion Max Simms Memorial Camp.

WHEN: The Lions Leadership Institute will be held on the weekend of May 1-3, 2009. Exact times and a meeting agenda will accompany the letter of acceptance.

WHY: The Lions Leadership Institute will provide intensive training in leadership that will help prepare participants to assume positions of leadership within their club, zone, district and community.

HOW: The Lions Leadership Institute will be organized by and conducted by Lions from Districts N3 and N4.

NOTE: A budget has been prepared that guarantees that accommodations and meal cost at the camp will be taken care of. It is also hoped that we may be able to help with transportation cost. No deposit is required with the nomination form. However, a deposit of \$50.00 per nominee will be required later with the registration form to confirm acceptance at the institute. More details will be provided with the letter of acceptance.
