
projects and those in our vides two new hands to help us provide the services and makes it easier. LIONS you should be proud of your accomplishments.



WE SERVE - NOW HEAR THIS

I've been involved with the PEI Hearing Impaired Community for nearly 30 years. Back then, the challenge was for hearing impaired children to have an equal opportunity as other students and today those students do have that opportunity through intergration in all classrooms, having audiologists directly involved with the students, and most of all technological advances in equipment, eg would be fm systems and cocohlear implants.

For those H.I. Students & others we helped improved their quality of life with audio loops in churches and infra red systems. APSEA (Atlantic Provinces Special Education Authority) oversees the education of mostly all disabled school children.

What I saw this summer and couldn't believe began when I was working lost kids, a program where we provide a stick on tag in which the parents cell phone # is recorded.

Here I am placing tags on these kids and then watching those irresponsible parents taking them down to a grassy area to watch and listen to summerfest concert, headlined by Great Big Sea. My wife and I are 200' from the stage and the noise is incredible, the db level was about 70-80db. (85db over a period of time say 8 hours will cause hearing loss). At the source I would guess the noise level was 120-130db and those nut cases running to the front of the stage when the doors opened. The problem, as most of you know is that one does not recognize this loss until it is too late. After a concert such as this, your hearing will rebound but not to the same level.

Hence, a noise pollution program such as I'm about to explain will warn students of the dangers and help them to preserve their hearing thru those golden years.

The program is very simple; it starts out by asking the question and explaining, what is sound? How do we hear?

How sound is measured? In two ways, frequency, the pitch, how low or high the sound, expressed in hertz, a measurement of cycles per second. Most of us can hear between 20Hz and 20,000 Hz. Secondly, intensity, the loudness of sound, measured in decibels (dB's)..

What is noise? With the aid of an overhead we would briefly explain the purpose and workings of the outer, middle and inner ear. In otherwords how the ear works. How those hair-like-cells that convert vibrations into nerve impulses eventually bend and break with loud noise They do not regenerate and that means they transmit less sound information to the brain, resulting in hearing loss. Some of you are more sensitive to noise than others but every single person is affected by excess noise.

The affect depends on a number of things:

Loudness pitch length of exposure surroundings age

previous ear trouble distance from & position of source

Then we would open it up to the classroom with a question. Have you ever come home from a concert and found you couldn't hear for awhile then it was back the next morning? This is known as temporary (threshold) shift. From here you would demonstrate dangerous levels of noise with a noise meter and the use of ear muffs and ear plugs.

To commence:

Letters would need to be sent to the school principal and teacher asking for permission to present this progam during Hearing Awareness Month, May.

Usually by this time of year, teachers are looking for a change and glad for a program such as this.

If your club decides proceed, a 30 page document would be sent to your club at the cost of \$10.00 (\$7. Staples producton costs + \$3. postage).

Teaching time approximately 30 minutes, interacting with the students could take it to 40 minutes.

You would also require a digital sound meter Source @ \$50.), set of ear plugs and ear muffs and possibly bookmaks such as the ones being handed out today.

If your club is interested in such a project, please let me know. Thank you for attentiveness.

Dear Club Officers,

Earlier this month I was privileged to be present at an inspiring event: the International Paralympic Games in Beijing. I saw men and women who had lost limbs swim at world record speeds, blind athletes perform amazing feats of strength and runners who rely on artificial legs run faster than all but those who set Olympic records at some of the same venues just a few weeks earlier.



I came away feeling that there are no obstacles that cannot be overcome and especially, that we Lions have the potential to perform even greater miracles of service than we have ever imagined.

Both the Paralympics and the Olympic Games also reminded me of the importance of teamwork. At the Olympics, the Chinese men's and women's gymnastic teams could not have won their gold medals if their specialists in floor exercise and balance beam, parallel bars and still rings did not perform up to their personal best.

Every Lions Club and indeed all of Lions Clubs International work in much the same way. Each of us has unique gifts that we bring to our mission of service and we owe it to ourselves, our fellow Lions and our communities to use them to the best of our ability. When we do and when we work together toward a common goal, there is almost nothing we cannot accomplish.

But just as American swimmer Michael Phelps came away from the games as the most honored athlete, we Lions reserve our highest recognition for those who have mastered several disciplines. That's what the Club President Excellence award is all about. To qualify, club presidents must be "all-around champions" and excel in areas including service, administration, leadership, membership growth and contributions to LCIF. Not everyone can win an Olympic medal, but an Excellence Award is within reach of every Lions Club president. You owe it to your community, your club and most of all, yourself to strive for this achievement. You should also know that your efforts reflect not only on your club and yourself, but also on fellow Lion leaders in your district. Excellence Awards for Zone, Region and District officers are contingent upon having at least 50 percent of the clubs under their leadership achieve Excellence Awards. I urge you to do everything in your power to help further the culture of excellence at all levels of our association.

Another way to help foster excellence is through the new International Hero Awards which will be presented at the 2009 International Convention in Minneapolis, Minnesota, USA. These awards are designed

to recognize the everyday heroes among us. These are Lions who excel, often without fanfare, at meeting the needs of our closest neighbors and neighbors around the globe. They are individuals who have embraced their potential to have a direct and positive impact on our world. They deserve to be celebrated and we have a responsibility to ensure that they no longer go unrecognized. Please be on the lookout for the everyday heroes in our midst and consider nominating those you know for an International Hero Award. Finally, I ask each and every one of you to embrace your own power to affect your community and the world community. Your leadership year is an extraordinary opportunity to make things happen. Exercise your leadership by making ambitious plans and sharing them with the members of your club. Do not hesitate to propose new initiatives for service. Ensure that our traditional service priorities receive the attention that they deserve. Spread the word about Lions through <u>effective communication</u> with your community. These steps are not mere self-aggrandizement. They are key components in attracting new members who will increase our ability to live our Lions motto – We Serve.

Lions Foundation Of Canada Report For The Year 07 / 08 14 Sep 08 Cabinet Meeting

This is the 25th year of service that the Foundation has provided a Dog Guide free of charge to thousands of Canadians. We are proud to report that Lions and Lioness from across Canada donated \$955,460.76 plus \$633,327.00 from The Purina Walk for Dog Guides this past year. Congratulation to the 33 Clubs of NB who donated, your amount was \$28,904.01 up 321.01% from the previous year. Thanks goes out as well to the eight(8) Clubs who held the Purina walk and raised \$18,353.00. Keep up the good work.

Lions, due to the most successful past few years of donations, the Foundation is currently doing a \$2million expansion. This will allow us to train 125 Clients per year instead of 100 as in the past.

Lions please remember that the Foundation is yours and it is sure something that you can be proud of. When you donate funds to the Foundation, please make sure that you honor your members by asking for an award such as: Life Membership \$100, fellowship \$250 or a judge Brian Stevens Fellowship \$500.

ALERT Chair Report September 13, 2008

The Flood of 2008 will be remembered in New Brunswick for years to come. Past District Governor Luke Stennick applied to LCIF for an Emergency Relief Grant on behalf of District N-1 and received \$10,000.00, which was applied to the Red Cross effort along the Saint John River to help people forced to evacuate their homes because of rising flood waters.

Barkers Point Lions were called to action with the City of Fredericton Emergency Measures Organizational Group using our Vulnerable Citizens Registry. The Club members contacted those living in the area subject to flooding. One resident evacuated to the hospital where her special medical needs could be met; one left to stay with friends, and one decided to stay at home during the flood. This individual was monitored during and after the flood to make sure that everything was safe and that the person was still content to be at home. Barkers Point was very proud to assist the EMOG and the people of Fredericton during this situation and very pleased that the Vulnerable Citizen's Registry operated exactly as planned and hoped for.

With or without an Emergency Operational Group in your Municipality, I encourage each club to consider having an ALERT chair and formulating some disaster planning such as the Citizens Registry in your communities.
