I am very proud to say that our REACH is expanding. We are asking people to help us serve. District N-1 has grown by 17 members to the end of October. Many of our clubs have developed exciting events to share information with our communities which is propelling the positive growth. Keep up the good work Lions!

We have received responses from 25.00% of the 80 clubs with 18.75% agreeing to support the project. Please ask you clubs to support our children with hearing and vision disabilities. Their education is too important not to give them every learning opportunity we can. Just drop me an e-mail, telephone call or fax with the amount you can contribute.

Information on the International Convention in Toronto is now available. The charter bus to help make this exciting event more affordable for all Lions is \$227.00 per person. This compares with airline seat sales of \$298-\$325 plus airport shuttle costs (November 14). We will provide pick up points in Moncton, Salisbury, Fredericton, and St. Leonard. This is a 47 seat intercity motor coach that is PA/DVD video equipped with on board washrooms. It will be extremely important to book early. Booking will require a financial commitment of \$80 that will be applied toward your trip but will be non-refundable. Once we have commitment for the 47 passengers, we will secure the booking with a deposit. The bus will travel from New Brunswick to Toronto, drop us off at our assigned hotel, the Marriott Downtown Easton Center, which is on the shuttle schedule, approximately noon July 4, and will pick up at the same location approximately 2:00-3:00 July 8, 20-13 for the return trip.

I have been assisting the DG with Charter Nights and other events that time and circumstance will not allow him to do. We all were present to congratulate our newest club in Saint John.

In the spirit of true Lionism, please do not forget the suffering in the Philippines. We can now make any personal donations over \$20 through our Canadian foundation to be able to get a tax receipt.

Governor, Head Table, Lions All;

In the second quarter, no disasters in our District have been reported.

Although on Friday, November 8th, reports of the destruction filtered in from hard hit areas of the Philippines where it was estimated that more than 10,000.00 people have died. Emergency Grants of US\$30,000 were immediately sent. Then Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) made \$130,000 available to Philippine Lions to provide immediate relief. That amount quickly increased to \$500,000 through donations from Lions Clubs members in neighboring countries and around the world.

There are more than 12,000 Lions members in the Philippines that will work with government officials and other agencies to send food, water and other supplies to the disaster area. Lions will base their local support operations in Cebu.

In the last ten years, LCIF has provided more than \$100 million for disaster-relief programs worldwide. All monies donated to Typhoon Haiyan in the Philippines, will be Melvin Jones usable.

I have asked all clubs in the District to assign an Alert Chair, and return their contact information to me so we can move along, trying to be prepared in case of a disaster or emergency in our communities. Up to now I have received only 3. I will resend again to all secretaries and ask their presidents to appoint an Alert Chair for their club.

Hoping we never see the disasters, like what has been happening all around us. The most resent: Typhoon Haiyan in the Philippines or like the Tornadoes that hit Oklahoma just not too long ago.

"We need to be prepared". We have the programs let's use them.

District Governor Head table and fellow Lions

Membership in our District, District N-1, to the end of October 2013 stands at 2020 members in 80 different Clubs according to the "healthy club report" that I receive every month. This monthly report goes on to show that in the USA we have 3 Clubs with 5 new members and 1 drop for a net total of 4 new members. In Canada we have 77 Clubs with 40 new members and 27 drops for a net gain of 13. This gives the District a net growth of 17 members this Lionestic year, not a bad start but let's keep up the good work.

Other information obtained from this report is as follows.

- 13 Clubs had increases, but 12 had decreases.
- 21 Clubs are below 15 members
- 21 Clubs are between 15 and 19 members.
- These last two items means that there are 42 Clubs below the number required to Charter a Club. That is 52.5% of the Clubs in the District.

Fellow Lions this is not good, we need new members.

While I am dishing out information, it goes on. There is supposed to be a monthly membership report MMR sent in every month. 17 Clubs have not filed a copy with LCI in the 1 to 10 month range, while 3 are in the 11 to 20 range, 2 in the 21 to 30 range.

4 Clubs have not sent in their PU 101's for the year yet.

Activity reports are no better, 22 Clubs have not filed reports in the 1 to 10 month range, 2 in the 11 to 20 range, 1 in the 21 to 30 range, 2 in the 41 to 50 range, and 4 in the over 50 range with one Club being at 87.

Lion Presidents where are your reports, are they up to date, or are you one of the above. If so, is your secretary having a problem sending these reports? If so please contact me and I will try to assist them or better yet, find someone who can offer assistance. Help is there for the asking and I would be only too pleased to assist in any way I possibly can.

With regards to your own membership growth, are you satisfied with our numbers? Are you not getting older like some of us, do you not want help on your projects? Most of all do you see what will happen to your Communities if you do not start a recruitment program, and yes that means in some cases of

allowing women into the Club, and giving them the challenges that we all face within our Club, and let them assist in filling the ranks.

What will happen to your community if your Lions Club is not there in the future? Who will help send the parents with their young ones when they go away to hospital or for some other treatment? What about the poor and needy that in the past you have helped assist with a tank of oil or some food on different occasions? Think of all the different things that your Club has done in the past. These requests are not going to go away, in fact they are multiplying faster than we like. Will you be there to help?

International has changed to rules for membership, in that there is not the need to attend meetings as in the past, talk to me about this after, either today or send me an e-mail or give me a phone call and we can discuss this.

Need training for your present members and the new ones you are going to recruit after today? There are training programs which are available to you and I know if you contact GLT Lion Stewart, he would be only too happy to set something up for you and there are many Lions around, especially in this room, that would be more than willing to assist if asked. Don't be shy ask for assistance. There are training program for Presidents, Secretaries, and Treasurers and for the most important Lion in your hall, your Membership Chair. Fellow Lions in closing as a big favor to your communities, to our District, your Governor and yes perhaps even a little for me, let's be active in our recruitment programs and try for at least on new member per Club this year to assist in the District Governors in his plan for the year.

As this is the last time we will be together before the New Year I would like, on behalf of my family wish you and yours a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.
