Happy New Years Lions,

Here it is January 2013 – another year is well underway, as January slips away. I hope all Lions and their families enjoyed the Christmas Season with family and friends and spent a safe and Happy New Year.

It is time Lions to take an inventory of our Lions projects and Lions Service Activities, revisit our community's needs to ensure we are meeting the needs of our communities. Review the January – March Club Pit Stop Checklist, which is enclosed in this Newsletter.

We are already approaching the finish line for Lap 7 so Lions this means that there are 5 Laps left in our Lions year.

In checking your pit stops please remember to close the back door, make an effort to stop some of the drops and retain our Lions members. Often it takes only communication to encourage Lions to take part in club activities, but I also know that sometimes we have to change our ways to encourage these members to stay with us. We have Inducted 97 new members in the past 7 months, but we have also dropped 93 members. Many of these drops are the result of some club members controlling the meetings and not listening to the membership or giving them a chance to take part in forming their ideas for new projects. We have also lost several Lions due to death and we need to take a moment to remember all those we have lost and remember their years of service.

To date I have visited 42 clubs in our District and my plans are to complete my visitations before the District Convention in April. I must tell you that meeting the Lions in our District is a



highlight, seeing how various clubs interact and the service projects that our clubs are involved in reaffirms the all-important work Lions do in their communities. I encourage all clubs to have a visitation chair that is proactive in scheduling club visits.

We are still struggling to get our campus clubs organized and it appears we will be looking at chartering then as branch clubs for now. Here is the positive, we are there, we have trained Lions to go into our Universities, our name is out there and we have encouraged Clubs with Campuses in their area to become involved. So Lions the future looks bright, we need to continue engaging youth.

Looking at our District we have areas throughout our District where Lions are needed. I ask that all Lions challenge themselves and their club to identify an area where we should be focused on forming a new Lions Club. Forward your ideas to

me so we can begin this process. Lions we need to continue to involve ourselves with youth, we are aging and youth, defined is:

Youth is generally the time of life between childhood and adulthood (maturity). Definitions of the specific age range that constitutes youth vary. An individual's actual maturity may not correspond to their chronological age, as immature individuals can exist at all ages. Youth is also defined as "the appearance, freshness, vigor, spirit, etc., characteristic of one who is young". Youth is a term used for people of both sexes, male and female, of a young age.Robert Kennedy wrote: "This world demands the qualities of youth: not a time of life but a state of mind, a temper of the will, a quality of imagination, a predominance of courage over timidity, of the appetite for adventure over the life of ease."

Lions I encourage you to get involved in the youth of your community, form a Leo Club, it offers an avenue for our youth to

General Procedural Guidelines for Club Elections.

Club Elections - Timing: Elections are to be held no later than April 15 of each year. The club secretary is required, either by mail or by personal delivery, to give notice to each member of the club at least fourteen (14) calendar days prior to the date of election. (Standard Form Club By- Laws, Article IV, Section 1.)

Nomination Committee: The Club President appoints the nomination committee, which submits the names of candidates for various club offices to the club membership at the nomination meeting. (Standard Form Club By-Laws, Article IV, Section 2.)

Nominations: Nominations may be made from the floor of the nomination meeting. Once nominations have been closed, no more nominations may be made. If the nominee/s are unable to serve, and there is no other nominee, the nominating committee may submit, at the election meeting, names of additional nominees for that office. (Standard Form Club By-Laws, Article IV, Section 2 and 3.)

Eligibility for Office: To be eligible for club office, the Lion must be an active member in good standing. (Standard Form Club By-Laws, Article II, Section 2.)

General Voting Guidelines: Unless otherwise provided in the respective club constitution and bylaws, the election shall be by ballot by those present and eligible to vote. A plurality vote is necessary to

> Quorum: The presence in person of a majority of the members in good standing. (Standard Form Club By-Laws, Article III, Section 5.)

> Eligibility to vote: Voting privileges are granted to members present who are in good standing and fall into one of the following membership categories: Active, Affiliate, Associate, Life, Member at Large and Privileged. The president is entitled to one vote, so long as he or she is in good standing.

Plurality vote: The candidate receiving the largest number of votes has a Plurality

Form of Ballot: Unless otherwise pro vided in the respective club con-

stitution and by-laws, or other adopted rules, in elections, "for" and "against" spaces or boxes should not be used. They are applicable only with respect to votes on motions. An election, in effect, is a vote on filling a blank, and a voter can vote against one candidate only by voting for another who has been nominated or by writing in the name of another candidate.

General Principles Regarding Elections:

All elections should be guided by the provisions contained in the respective club, district and International Constitution and By-Laws, or by any rules of procedure adopted by the respective club or district for lections or by local statute or common law. Otherwise, all questions of order or procedure should be determined in accordance with Roberts' Rules of Order Newly Revised, as revised from time to time.

PU 101 - The form identifying the incoming executive of a Lions Club must be filed with Lions Clubs International as well as your District. A copy must go to your 1st Vice District Governor (District Governor Elect) so he/she may complete their directory.

The expanded Certified Guiding Lion Program, initially designed for new clubs, provides Guiding Lions with the knowledge and resources to assist both new and struggling clubs. The newly revised program features six sections to improve club health:

- 1. Skills of a Successful Guiding Lion Assesses the Lion's personal leadership skills.
- 2. Get off to a Good Start Leads participants through the programs, materials and resources available to support club health.
- 3. Develop a Club Officer Mentor Team Helps the Guiding Lion build a practical and job specific team of mentors to support the unique needs of each club officer.
- 4. **Design Club Officer Training** Provides an outline for delivering area specific club officer training based on the club's needs.
- 5. **Guiding Lion Resources** Acquaints the Guiding Lion with the reports that the Lion will receive to track the health of the developing club as well as other helpful resources.
- 6. **NEW!** Club Rebuilding The Certified Guiding Lion Rebuilding Assessment Form helps identify areas of strength and areas that need improvement so the Guiding Lion can adapt the course to meet the unique needs of a struggling club.

REQUIRED PRE-WORKSHOP ASSIGNMENT

Send me your articles, events and pictures. Participants are required to complete their workbook prior to the course so they are able to discuss the course material effectively. They should allow 5 to 6 hours to cover the material prior to the course. This course utilizes several on-line courses which are difficult to effectively demonstrate in a classroom setting.
