

Usher in a New Era for Lions

It's easy to be awed by athletes and entertainers, but the most impressive people I know are the women who have been part of my life. My dear mum, now 97, was loving, and caring and a great role model as well, volunteering at church and school and for Scouts. As a Realtor, I hired and counted on women. I quickly learned they were particularly determined to grow their skills and be successful. As a Lion, I've been amazed by the generosity and gifts of women. As just one example, Australian Lion Pauline Henebery has run the remarkable Education Builds Bridges, enabling Lions to help disadvantaged children in Indonesia.

Perhaps the greatest move ever made by Lions Clubs International was to admit women. Probably the second-best initiative would be to swell our ranks with them. We're lagging behind in this regard. 52% of the world population is female, yet only 24.5 percent of Lions are women. My dream is to increase female membership by 5.5 percent this Lions year to bring us up to 30 percent and then to achieve a 50/50 ratio by our centennial year in 2017.

We don't want more women so we can puff out our chests and boast of membership equality. **We need the gifts and talents of women.** They bring a different perspective, a different skill set and a new bundle of can-do energy and enthusiasm. *They set goals, take on tasks and accomplish objectives in a way that men can't, don't or won't.* I don't want to stir up trouble by saying women are our better half, but they certainly are half of humanity and carry the same talents and capabilities.

Be sure to make your club welcoming to women. Seek them out and invite them in.




PEI Lions Clubs Support Diabetes Research and Children's Camp



Renovation at South End School

SAINT JOHN – A \$50,000 renovation at a south end school will mark a fresh beginning for children who ate lunch under the program once run by convicted child sex offender Donnie Snook, community members say.



Local business owners and individuals have launched the effort under a new south end Lions Club. So when close to 300 children receive free lunches at St. John the Baptist-King Edward School this fall, the healthier meals will be served up from a shiny, new, industrial-grade kitchen.

"There's a need, and we want to work in the lower south end, and help out, get the confidence back, earn the people's confidence and get involved so they can help themselves," said Holly Singh, who with her husband Ken Singh owns Thandi's restaurant uptown.

Singh is the acting president of a newly formed Lions Club in the south end.

As soon as the club established a charter, they set out to help the school, which they knew was in need of a lift.

"It was desperate," said Singh, who used to run the school cafeterias in Hampton. "I don't know how they were doing it."

When Singh saw the state of the kitchen, she asked Coun. Gerry Lowe, another member of the new Lions Club, if he thought they could raise money for a new commercial kitchen. Now, only a few weeks later, they are close to their goal.

The club has already ordered new equipment, including a stainless steel fridge and freezer, a commercial dishwasher, commercial stove, large mixer, stainless steel tables, pot sinks, storage and dishes.

"We're going to be ready to roll for September," Singh said. "It'll be equipped like a regular cafeteria kitchen."

But the work won't stop at the upgrade. Singh and the club, which includes other restaurant and business owners, will help provide nutritious meals based on Canada's Food Guide. Singh wants to help the group plan a menu made of wholesome foods – such as pasta, meat and fresh fruit and vegetables – that the children will enjoy.

Coun. Gerry Lowe, who was elected in May to fill the seat of Snook, a former councillor, said he was motivated to do something for the same school he attended as a youngster.

"People in the community were hurt, and they still are," he said, referring to the aftermath of Snook's conviction. "We're hoping this will help the kids."

Uptown restaurants will help provide the food for Mondays, the YMCA will volunteer for Wednesdays and Irving Oil assists on Fridays, she said. Now the group is looking for donations of time and money for Tuesdays and Thursdays.

"Everyone's very excited and coming forward and wanting to be apart of it," she said. "I'm excited to see the community taking ownership of the program again."

Zoë Watson, superintendent of the Anglophone South School District, said the school officials are overwhelmed by the donation of equipment. District staff will be working with the group on plumbing and electrical work.

"We are very fortunate to have so much support for schools," she said in an email.

Dear Lions, Did you know that up to 80 percent of global blindness is

preventable? Lions and LCIF are working hard to reduce that number and I am happy to say that we are making a difference. An example of this is our efforts and partnerships aimed at eliminating onchocerciasis (river blindness), a disease that can lead to blindness. Last month, I was able to join former U.S. President and Lion Jimmy Carter at a special celebration in Colombia. Through the work of LCIF and Lions, The Carter Center, the Colombian government and other dedicated people and organizations, Colombia became the first of six countries in the Americas to <u>eliminate river blindness</u>. I am so proud of our role in this achievement. It is



through the SightFirst program that LCIF helps Lions deliver services that target diseases such as river blindness, cataract and trachoma; build or expand facilities; train professionals; and build awareness about eye health in underserved communities. LCIF also supports many services for the visually impaired, including education and rehabilitation. Just last week, LCIF's SightFirst Advisory Committee approved 32 SightFirst grants for a total of US\$7.5 million. These projects will help Lions in Belize, the United States, Brazil, Nepal and other countries complete diverse sight-saving projects. I was recently able to see a great example of a project in the United States at the Spectrios Institute for Low Vision in Illinois. There, dedicated staff and doctors help people with low vision obtain tools, technology, training and support. An LCIF grant helped expand a portion of the institute, and it was inspiring to hear the stories of the people who have From helping a country eliminate a blinding disease to been helped. helping a person with reduced vision realize that they can still read, you are making a difference. And LCIF is here to help you make that difference.
