# **About APSEA**

The Atlantic Provinces Special Education Authority (APSEA) is an interprovincial cooperative agency established in 1975 by joint agreement among the Ministers of Education of New Brunswick, Newfoundland, Nova Scotia, and Prince Edward Island.

The agreement provided for the creation of the Atlantic Provinces Special Education Authority and authorized it to provide educational services, programs, and opportunities for persons from birth to 21 years of age with low incidence sensory impairments. This includes children and youth who are deaf, deaf-blind, hard of hearing, blind, or visually impaired and who are residents of Atlantic Canada.

The APSEA Agreement is the only one of its kind in Canada, and as such, may serve as a model for service delivery at a regional level. Operational costs are shared among the four provinces.

# Board of Directors

APSEA is governed by a Board of Directors of 12 persons, three from each province. The Deputy Minister of Education from each province is a permanent member of the Board. The two additional members from each province are appointed by the Lieutenant Governor-in-Council for two-year terms. The board is responsible for overall planning and policy.

# Mission Statement

We provide quality services and supports, in collaboration with our partners, to meet the educational needs of children and youth from birth to 21 who are blind/visually impaired (BVI) and/or deaf/hard of hearing (DHH).

# **Vision**

We are a support for families and the public school system in the education of children and youth with sensory loss. Our professional commitment focuses on providing, through best practice and in the most natural environments possible, comprehensive educational opportunities, which lead to the highest potential for independence, self-sufficiency and productive, fulfilling lives.

As I have advertised in the past, our objective of the Lions **ALERT** Program is to develop a plan of action in case of a **Level One** (affecting a few people), **Level Two** (affecting a community) or **Level Three** emergency (affecting hundreds or thousands of people in a region). One person being affected is as serious to that person, as if it was to a large group, we cannot forget the Level ones.

There are now 4 clubs in the District that have registered their building as an EMO and/or Shelter area in case of a disaster in their community, and more clubs in the process. There is also one club in the middle of setting up a Vulnerable Citizens Registry Program with their Town. This is an excellent program; check out what Barkers Point Lion's Club in Fredericton does with their Disaster Registry, also Hampton Lions Club's Sentinel Emergency Preparedness System, as to what they are all about on their web sites.

If there is anyone else working on a program that I am not aware of? Please don't stop, keep the balls rolling and get back to me with what it consists of. Also if you were not the one chairing your clubs Alert committee last year, please communicate with that chair, for an update and maybe assistance. Please don't let all their efforts fall by the wayside, only having to repeat in their footsteps, and redo all over again.

I will be asking all club Presidents to assign an Alert Chair, and return their contact information to me, so we can move along trying to be prepared in the case of a disaster or emergency.

This year \$15,5600.00 was raised for Diabetes from the Calvacade.

On Sunday June 2 The Canadian Diabetes Flame of Hope Walk/run was held. Our club helped with the traffic control at the busy intersections. There were hundreds of participants raising funds for Diabetes awareness.

Camp appreciation day was held for *Red Fox*, PEI Diabetes kids camp, at Canoe Cove Christian Camp on Wednesday July 31. An invitation was sent to all lions clubs to attend. Several lions did attend as well a local politician and the local newspaper reporter. We had an opportunity to speak with the campers, camp staff, nurses and doctors and had a tour. We joined the campers for lunch, where we presented the Calvacade cheque to Terry Lewis, Manager Canadian Diabetes Association for PEI and gave all the kids a calvacade pin. We received several thank you cards from the campers and they had a large banner displayed, thanking the *Lions*.

The PEI Gold Cup and Saucer Parade, largest parade east of Montreal was held on August 16. Our club was a major sponsor and had two floats entered. One was used for the Diabetes. It displayed the Diabetes and Lions banner and kids from summer camp enjoyed riding on it. The Maritimes TV station zoomed in and gave a fair amount of air time.


